

THE CERNER SITUATION

Since November of 2018 I have been traveling back to Kansas City (Missouri, yes I know there are two) where Cerner corporation is based. For those of you actively hiding from VA news, Cerner Millennium is the Electronic Health Record that



It's a Monday at SFO, I must be headed to Kansas City...

VA is migrating to, away from CPRS. San Francisco and VISN 21 are scheduled to change in December of 2021. Merry Christmas.

VA is holding weeklong "Clinical Council Workshops" at Cerner every 6 weeks which brings together 400 VA employees, a number of Department of Defense colleagues (*they started Cerner ahead of us*), and 100 or more Cerner employees to review our existing workflows and figure out how the heck we are going to do our work in Millennium.

The answer so far is that it is going to be a big change, not all of it horrible. For example, medication reconciliation is a much more natural process (working in rows, deciding which existing medications should be continued, at what dose and schedule when the patient is moving either into or out of the hospital), and progress notes take advantage of a two column format and at last will allow for **BOLD**, <u>underline</u>, *italics*, and even changes in colors for the fonts to draw attention to what is New, Old, and Important.

But it will be jarring, since notes are created at the END of the visit, not the beginning, and copy/paste/edit is harder to do. There are no more order menus the way that we think of them. Clinical reminders are very, very different. Consult management is...let's just call it a work in progress. And check your pulse when I tell you that "name last 4" is as dead as a doornail in Cerner. Names, dates of birth, and non-SSN MR numbers are the currency of the day.

I will be planning some "lunch & learn" style demos in the Auditorium in the future so that everyone can see what is going on.

But enough of that, you say, WHAT ABOUT THE BARBECUE?

Kansas City is reportedly a world-class barbecue mecca. I have had the opportunity to sample from a few places so want to give you a ranking based on what I have learned so far. The bottom line for me is that Austin and Nashville have KC beat, but everyone (including Dr. Rapko who has admonished me already) says that is because I still have not been to Joe's in KC...with the best of apparently everything at this remodeled gas station. I haven't been because there is reportedly a 90 minute wait OUTDOORS and every meeting so far in KC has been either frozen (with sleet, ice and snow falling) or boiling (you know with the 'feels like index' in the high 90s/low 100s).

VA MASTER CLINICANS SCRUTINIZED

...TOO THOUGHTFUL?

After failing to find a procedure code for 'deep deliberation,' VA accounting officials question financial viability of Master Clinician model of care.

In an unprecedented review of productivity for VA clinical services, a peculiar pattern was noted among faculty designated as UCSF *Master Clinicians*. RVUs earned per encounter were dramatically below average. This appears to be occurring in the setting of 2-3 hours of thorough chart review per patient—including 400-page Kaiser scans, an average of 4-7 non-VA specialties' documents, and time spent waiting for VistaWeb to reload.

Noting that a scalpel swipe may yield more VERA \$ than a carefully crafted,

multifaceted medical decision—there is mounting frustration from talented clinicians. Both understanding but pragmatic, one national billing consultant responded "Yes, we live in a world where wart removal is reimbursed higher than a follow up visit for a 92 year old with CAD, HF, RA, ESRD, COPD, DM, & onychomycosis presenting with FUO. Although, cutting his toenails may increase the value of that visit."

Another productivity expert remarked, "The degree of attention to detail we are seeing in notes by Masters is simply astounding—and should be lauded." Quickly followed by "But this much thought is simply not sustainable."

Flawed reimbursement structure aside, billing and compliance consultants suggest the **'The Rule of 5s'**. If you've reviewed more than 5 scanned documents, that's probably too many. If you've gone back more than 5 years, perhaps you've gone too far. If you've exceeded 5 minutes on any one organ system, move along, and if it takes you 5 days to write your note, well....enough said.



KEN'S KORNER

A Reflection on People Doing Great Things

It's hard to know how to react these days to current events. They pour over us like a tsunami, drowning our hope, compassion, and sense of justice. It's important to remind ourselves that there are truly amazing people working in our hospital, our local community, and across the United States – selflessly giving of themselves to promote a more just society for all. I want to draw your attention to two amazing people whose commitment to social justice for the underserved has recently uplifted my spirits and given me renewed hope.

The first is our own Josh Bamberger who has worked as a PCP in the SFVAHCS Downtown Clinic, serving this past year as interim director. He was recently joined at the DTC by Emma Shak, a new GIM faculty who shares his commitment to the underserved. For almost 30 years, Josh has been a passionate advocate for the homeless and recently housed population in the Bay Area. He has worked tirelessly to draw the attention of the civic and private leaders to the need to find safe housing for this population as the best means to address their medical issues, mental illness and substance abuse. Josh was the recipient of the 2015 Beverlee A. Myers Award for Excellence in Public Health. In 2019, he was named the Associate Director of the UCSF Benioff Homelessness and Housing Initiative through which he will work with UCSF's Margo Kushel to identify evidence-based solutions to prevent and end homelessness. Their work is made possible through a generous \$30 million gift from Marc and Lynne Benioff. It is worth noting that the Benioffs (founders of Salesforce) are in the Forbes Top 50 Philanthropist list, have provided enormous gifts to UCSF, and have created a model for corporate philanthropy to communities that has been mirrored by other companies. How uplifting is that?!

The second is Bryan Stevenson, a public interest lawyer in Montgomery, Alabama, and Executive Director of the Equal Justice Initiative. Mr. Stevenson has dedicated his life to helping the poor, the incarcerated, and the condemned. His life's work is the subject of a recent HBO documentary, "True Justice" – which I strongly encourage all of you to see. In watching it, my wife and I were moved beyond words. The film begins with the words enshrined on the front of the Supreme Court Building, "Equal justice under the law" – which Bryan has embraced as his per-

sonal mission statement as he has fought for the rights of death row inmates to a fair judicial process – five times in front of the Supreme Court. The film takes a powerful look at the history of racial inequality in the United States things that have contributed to injustice for the poor, including racial segregation and mass incarceration.

As we all struggle to make sense of the national and international tumult, it behooves us to remind each other that our communities are filled with advocates, artists, teachers, lawyers, medical professionals, and philanthropists who are committed to civic engagement, positive discourse, and problem solving. Let us give thanks to the myriad people like Dr. Bamberger, Mr. Stevenson and the Benioffs who are fighting for a more just world and share their examples with our children and our grandchildren.
